This presentation will give a brief analysis of healthcare deserts for medical resources that have featured prominently in the news lately: ambulance services, pharmacies, and hospitals that provide obstetric services.

3:30 PM Exploring the Role of Emerging Mobility Solutions in Shaping Care-Seeking Behaviors in Rural Communities

Javier Pena-Bastidas

Addressing transportation barriers to healthcare services in rural communities is a well-documented challenge. Emerging mobility solutions driven by advanced information and communication technologies, such as ride-hailing services, offer opportunities for healthcare access improvement. However, their adoption in rural areas lags behind their urban counterparts. This slower adoption rate in rural regions provides an opportunity to carefully consider the roles of these technologies and how they can effectively address rural healthcare access issues. Through a national survey coupled with open-access socioeconomic data in the United States, we aim to explore the potential contributions of emerging mobility solutions in shaping healthcare-seeking behaviors within rural communities. Specifically, we seek to understand how individuals with diverse socio-demographic backgrounds, health conditions, and social environments (including family, social network, and community) perceive these emerging mobility services and their potential to enhance rural healthcare access. The findings will offer valuable insights to stakeholders and practitioners looking to harness innovative mobility technologies for addressing rural healthcare access challenges.

Research has shown that up to 88% of trafficked victims present to a healthcare setting during their time of being trafficked. How to Alleviate Financial and Staffing Constraints With ACO Participation

Rusty Schlessman

Healthcare continues to face uncertainties. There are increased regulations, unprecedented levels of burnout, higher operating costs, and narrowed margins. Participating in an ACO has been proven to help with today's health care challenges, making it critical that rural hospitals and health systems position themselves for sustainable success in value-based care. Hear firsthand experiences from rural providers who have created an integrated value-based solution through ACO partnerships. They'll explore new advanced funding options to certain participants; how to use the Medicare Shared Savings Program as a stable business model to improve patient outcomes and generate savings; and clinical services and in-home capabilities that alleviate staffing shortage constraints, improve the care continuum and drive additional revenue streams.

Chronic Kidney Disease (CKD) in Rural Alabama: Assessments and Interventions to Minimize Disparities

Pamela Payne Foster, MD, MPH

The purpose of this research was to assess knowledge of chronic kidney disease among rural adults in Alabama; evaluate barriers experienced by those on dialysis, primary care providers, and nephrologists; and develop interventions. The interventions were designed to promote early diagnosis and timely referral to nephrologists as well as educate those with or at risk for CKD. Survey and interview data were collected from all stakeholders. Interventions were developed for primary care providers (interactive app) and those with or at risk for CKD (educational videos and handouts).

She has presented at the national and international levels and is a published author and journal reviewer in peer-reviewed journals and healthcare textbooks for her academic and clinical expertise. She has been acknowledged for her clinical and academic excellence and was appointed to the Healthy People Curriculum Taskforce, where she serves as an expert in population health, developing interprofessional curriculum for health care professionals across the nation. She is a PADMA Award recipient for her clinical accomplishments and was named the Nancy Smith Memorial Excellence in Teaching award recipient for her teaching excellence.
